Instead, many superheroes use secret identities and even masks!






Create a Check-It-Before-You-Share-It Poster

On the internet world, your credibility is worth something. If you start spreading things that are not true, pretty soon no one will believe you! Most importantly, fake news can hurt people. Imagine if you share that a serious disease can be cured by eating ice-cream, and someone follows this advice. How would you feel if the disease spread and more people got sick? Believe it or not, similar things happen every day online.

How can you tell if a website is telling the truth? Usually, websites that end with .edu, .org, .gov are much better sources of information. If you find a fact and want to check it, do a search on google and add the word "false" to it. You can also check on a website called "Snopes", which is a reliable source of fact-checking.


Mistakes Help Us Grow!
